I looked at it and realised it was not a disappointment; it was just different and then I was disappointed in myself for not realizing how much that racket cost. So, I took it to school and yes, some people laughed but I played a match with it, I lost but that didn't matter. I was not disappointed. Come my birthday Dad asked if I wanted a proper tennis racket, but I didn't need one, I already had one.

Some people say that life is full of disappointments, and undoubtedly, we all have them but perhaps the trick is to just make sure that we are not the ones disappointing someone else.

# All Saints C of E Primary School

*Living out our Christian*



What a half - term for Early Years! We have enjoyed lots of fun experiences and learnt lots over the last few months.

## Communication and Language



In Spring 1, we looked at the book 'Lost and Found' by Oliver Jeffers. We started by looking at the first couple of pages where a penguin knocks on the boy's front door! We discussed what we thought would happen next... We had lots of interesting ideas! In the story the boy took the penguin to the library to find out more about penguins. So we decided that we should also find out more about penguins. We discovered that penguins come from Antarctica and we couldn't wait to find out more about it! We found Antarctica on the map and globe and imagined what it would be like walking amongst the towering icebergs and sliding on the thick ice. We made icy pictures to depict Antarctica and then added a penguin to the picture. We then decided that we should find out what other animals could be found there and then added these to our pictures. The boy set sail in a boat to take the penguin back to his home in Antarctica! We also made some boats and set sail for Antarctic Unfortunately, the sea was very rough and stormy and many of our boats ended up needing repairs! At the end of the story we discovered that the penguin didn't want to go back to Antarctica, he just wanted a friend! So the boy and the penguin sailed back to the boy's home.



## Understanding the world

We have been observing the changes in nature as the seasons change.



We have been on a Spring welly walk and looked for lots of signs of Spring. We saw daffodils, daisies, green leaves, catkins and lots of buds. Unfortunately, we haven't seen any blossom yet! We have also investigated ice and its properties, discovering how it changes in different conditions. It has been a wonderful time of hands-on exploration and discovery!

## Mathematics

In mathematic we have continued to count daily, developing our understanding of number composition and representing numbers using marks, fingers, five or ten frames, and numerals. We have practised subitising, recognising numbers without counting, and identified smaller numbers within larger ones. Through songs and rhymes, we have explored the language of addition and subtraction in a fun and engaging way. We have really enjoyed exploring mass by comparing objects using balances, seesaws, and our hands. We found out that the largest object isn't necessarily the heaviest object! We also investigated capacity in the water tray. We found out which container held the most cupfuls of water and used different objects to find the capacity of container too! We also met 'Superworm' who is very long and very strong! We made our very own long Superworms using the playdough and compared different worms to find Superworm!



## Religious Education

In RE we have been exploring why the word 'God' is special to Christians. We listened to the Creation story and discussed God as the Creator, reflecting on the wonders of the world. We also explored the different ways of praising God and showed an understanding as to why Christians do this, such as giving thanks for the world around them. Through discussions and activities, we gained a deeper appreciation of these ideas in an engaging and thoughtful way. We even made our own picture of God's creation and decided where we wanted to put all the wonderful creatures.

## Expressive Art and Design

We have enjoyed drawing and painting lots of different animals this half- term and have looked carefully at their features. We also had great fun celebrating the 'Chinese New Year!' We held our own celebrations and took part in a dragon dance, had scarf dances and enjoyed acting out different scenarios in the Chinese Restaurant. We even tasted a variety of Chinese foods. We especially enjoyed the noodles! We are continuing to enjoy our weekly music sessions, where we have explored rhythm, melody, and movement. It has been a fun and enriching time filled with creativity and learning!

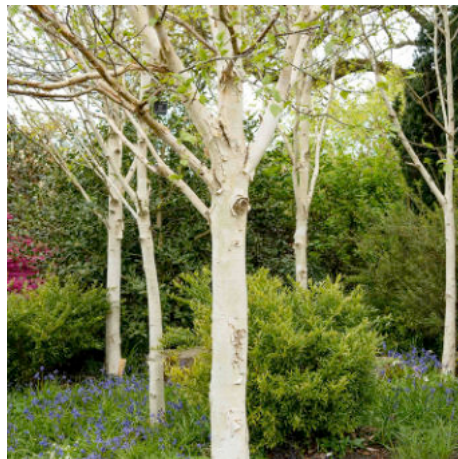

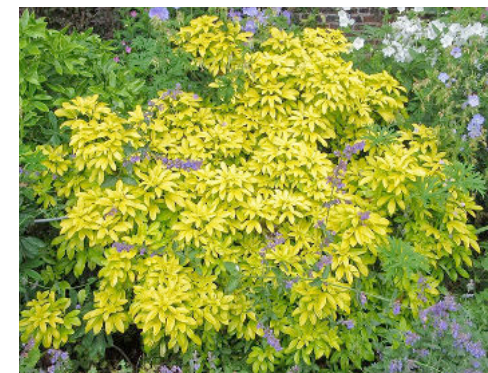
It is difficult to tell from the weather what month it is so it is reasonable to consider April a month of transition. There is still a legacy of winter with a silhouette of the trees which are yet to come into leaf. The silver birches are striking, especially those with very white bark such as the Himalayan Birch (*Betula utilis Jacquemontii*) choose either the single stemmed or multi stemmed according to the layout of your garden. Both the

plum and the Amelanchier will produce a lovely show of white flowers simultaneously. Later in the year the Victoria plum will produce



delicious fruit in the summer the Amelanchier will produce a lovely display of autumn leaf colour: *A. canadensis* - the variety *lamarkii* AGM is more suitable for domestic gardens since it only grows slowly up to 15 feet compared to the variety *Laevis* which grows to 30 feet. If you trim off a few pieces of new growth in bud they will open indoors in a vase & go well with some later flowering daffs.

There is plenty of colour from both flowers and foliage. The golden *Choisya* has been glowing all winter: *Choisya ternata Sundance* AGM. This is also known as



the Mexican orange blossom. The commoner variety has deep green leaves which have an aromatic scent but if you make sure you have the golden leaf variety I think the exchange of a brilliant gold leaf is worth the loss of scent. The white flowers later in spring provide the fragrance.

# Gardening...



Camellias are the first of the evergreens to burst into flower. There are white, pink and red varieties and they may have single or double flowers. (*C. williamsii* Brigadoon) (AGM) is a lovely semi double pink variety.

At ground level there is the successor to snowdrops, the *Leucojum* which is taller. Try to get *L. vernum* (AGM) rather than the commoner *aestivum* because it flowers longer. It is known as the 'spring snowflake' and it has a cousin 'the autumn

snowflake'. They are members of the *Amaryllidaceae* family ie. cousins of the *Hippiastrums*. Another perennial spring flower is the *Aubretia* which is hardy & produces a clump which gradually enlarges

over the years. It looks well in either a flower bed or on the edge of a raised bed.
